**Instructional Focus:**

<b>Reading</b> Students read a variety of grade level materials, applying strategies appropriate to various situations

**Performance Task**

The student reads *Great Expectations* by Charles Dickens. Philip Pirrup, or “Pip” as the student learns to refer to the main character, becomes a lawyer. The student researches the career of a lawyer and one case that the media has covered in detail. The student discusses this career option with the school guidance counselor and, if possible, a lawyer or legal aide. The student discusses the case he or she has researched with the lawyer or legal aide and asks his or her opinion about the case. The student writes on a computer about the process to becoming a lawyer and the skills required. In addition, the student writes about the case he or she researched and the lawyer or legal aide’s opinion of that case.

Next, the student researches cartoons that portray lawyers. The student creates a PowerPoint presentation with the cartoons the student has scanned into PowerPoint. Captions the student writes in the PowerPoint presentation should succinctly explain the context of the cartoon. The presentation must be professional in appearance. The student presents the PowerPoint presentation to the class and describes each cartoon.

The student understands after researching this information that, while there is a great deal of education involved in becoming a lawyer, modern society makes fun of this profession and the people in it. The student writes on a computer an opinion essay on why he or she thinks lawyers have become a subject of ridicule in today’s society when being a lawyer was once a very respected profession. The student substantiates his or her opinion based on the facts he or she has gathered from the research. The student may compare and contrast being a lawyer in a previous decade to being a lawyer today to explain the change in society’s attitude.
